Charley Harper Birds



In a style he called "minimal realism", Charley Harper captures the essence of his subjects with the fewest possible visual elements. When asked to describe his unique visual style, Charley responded: "When I look at a wildlife or nature subject, I don't see the feathers in the wings, I just count the wings. I see exciting shapes, color combinations, patterns, textures, fascinating behavior and endless possibilities for making interesting pictures. I regard the picture as an ecosystem in which all the elements are interrelated, interdependent, perfectly balanced, without trimming or unutilized parts; and herein lies the lure of the painting; in a world of chaos, the picture is one small rectangle in which the artist can create an ordered universe."

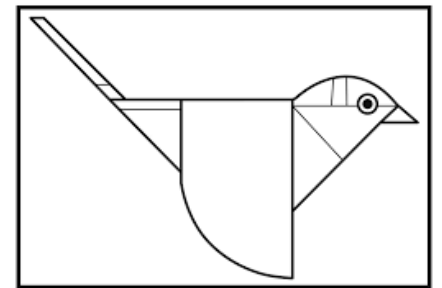
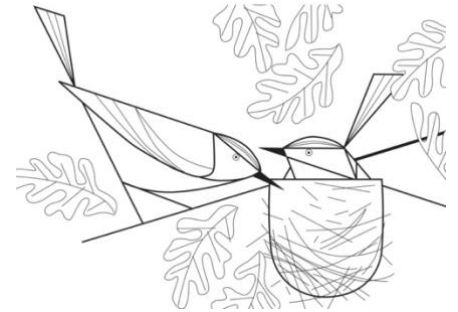
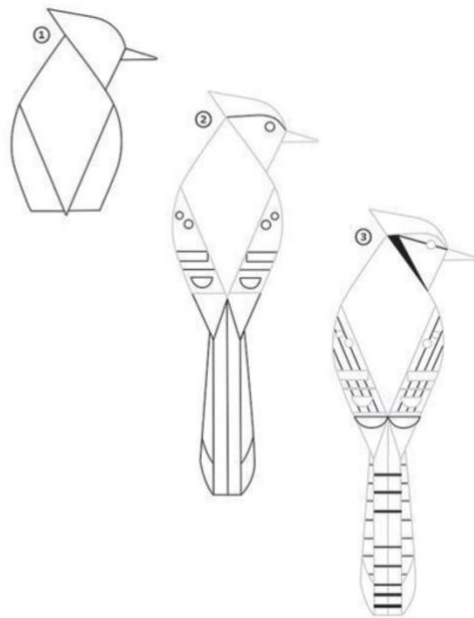
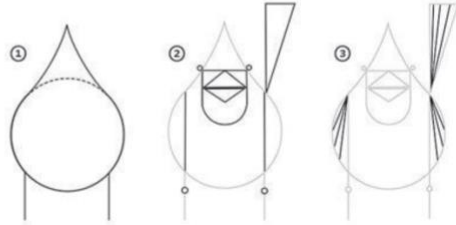
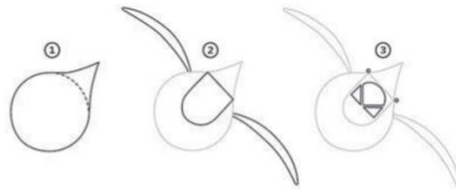

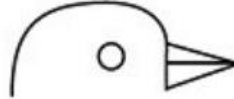


How To Draw a Bird

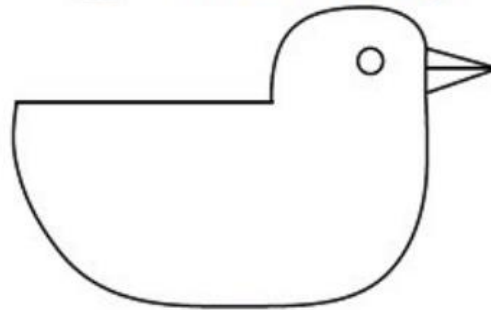
1 Draw a curved line for the head



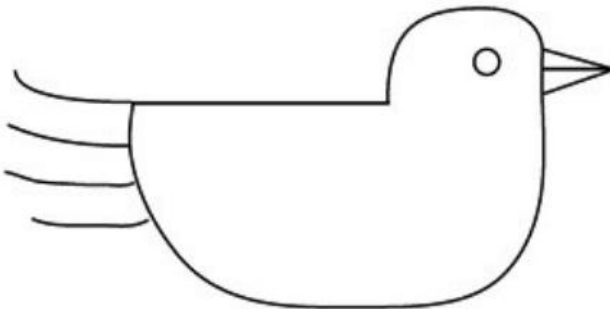
2 Add a circle for the eye and a beak



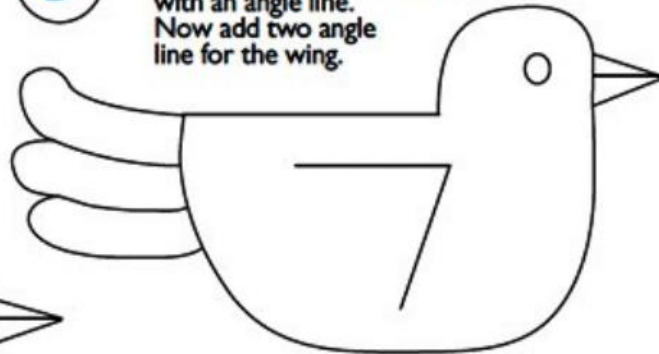
3 Draw a straight line for the bird's back and a smooth curved line for the belly.



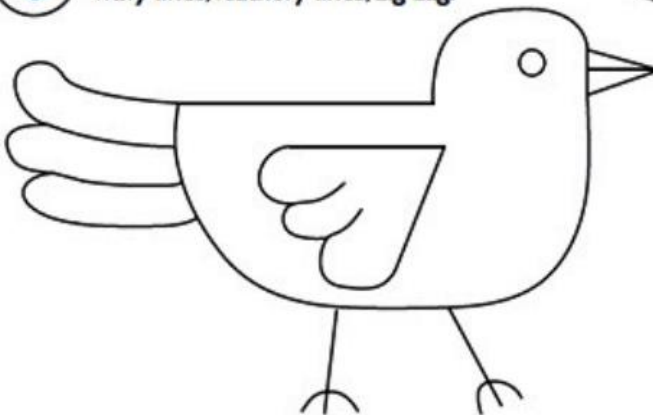
4 To make a tail, draw 4-5 straight or curly lines at the back of the bird.



5 Connect the tail lines together so that the tips are smooth. Or you could make a pointy tail by connecting the lines with an angle line. Now add two angle lines for the wing.



6 Connect the ends of these two lines with any shape you like: scallop lines, wavy lines, feathery lines, zig-zag.

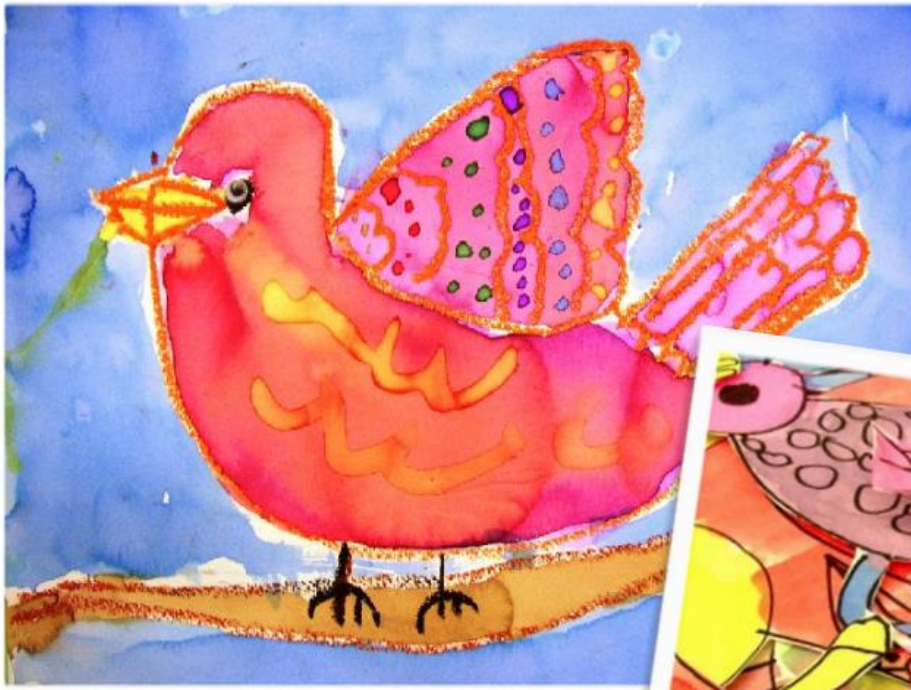

Drawing Tips:

Use an oil pastel or crayon to draw the bird. Children will naturally draw big and the temptation to erase or fix their "mistakes" will be reduced.

Instead, encourage children to draw together and keep going if they think they don't like a line. At the end of the lesson, the children can opt to keep their drawing or start again on the other side.

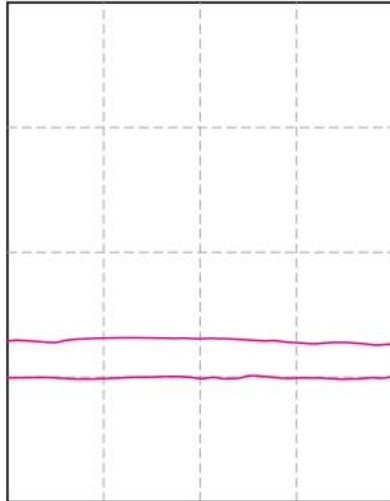

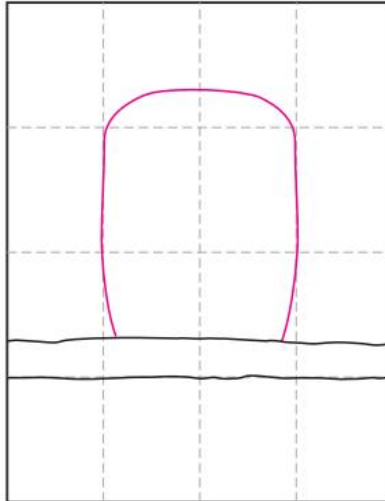

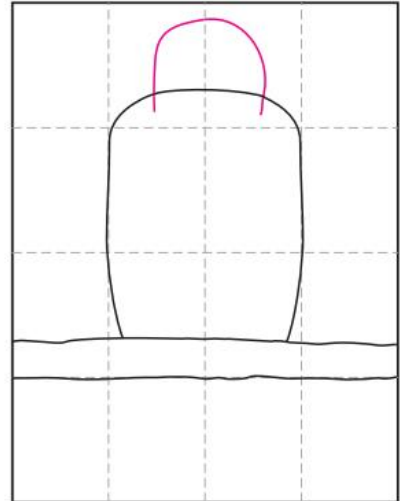
Draw a Bald Eagle



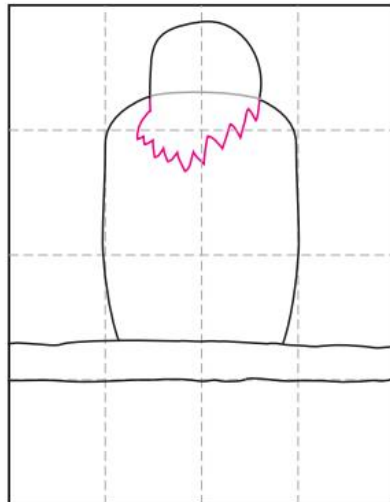
1. Make guidelines. Draw a branch.



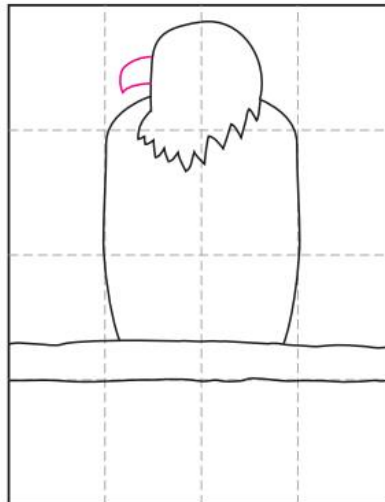
2. Start the body.



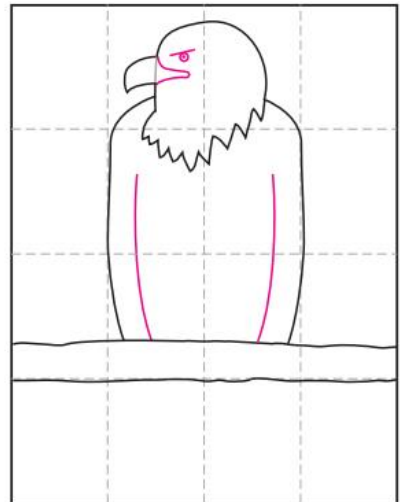
3. Draw the top of the head.



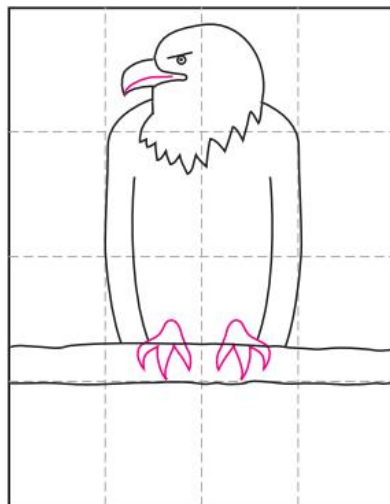
4. Draw the bottom feathers.



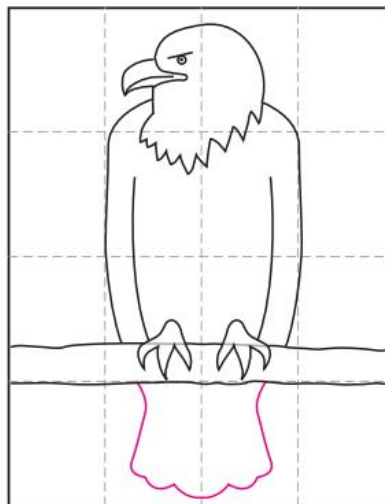
5. Add the beak.



6. Finish the face, add wing lines.



7. Finish beak. Draw two feet.



8. Erase inside of feet. Add a tail.



9. Trace and paint or color.

Hummingbird Collage

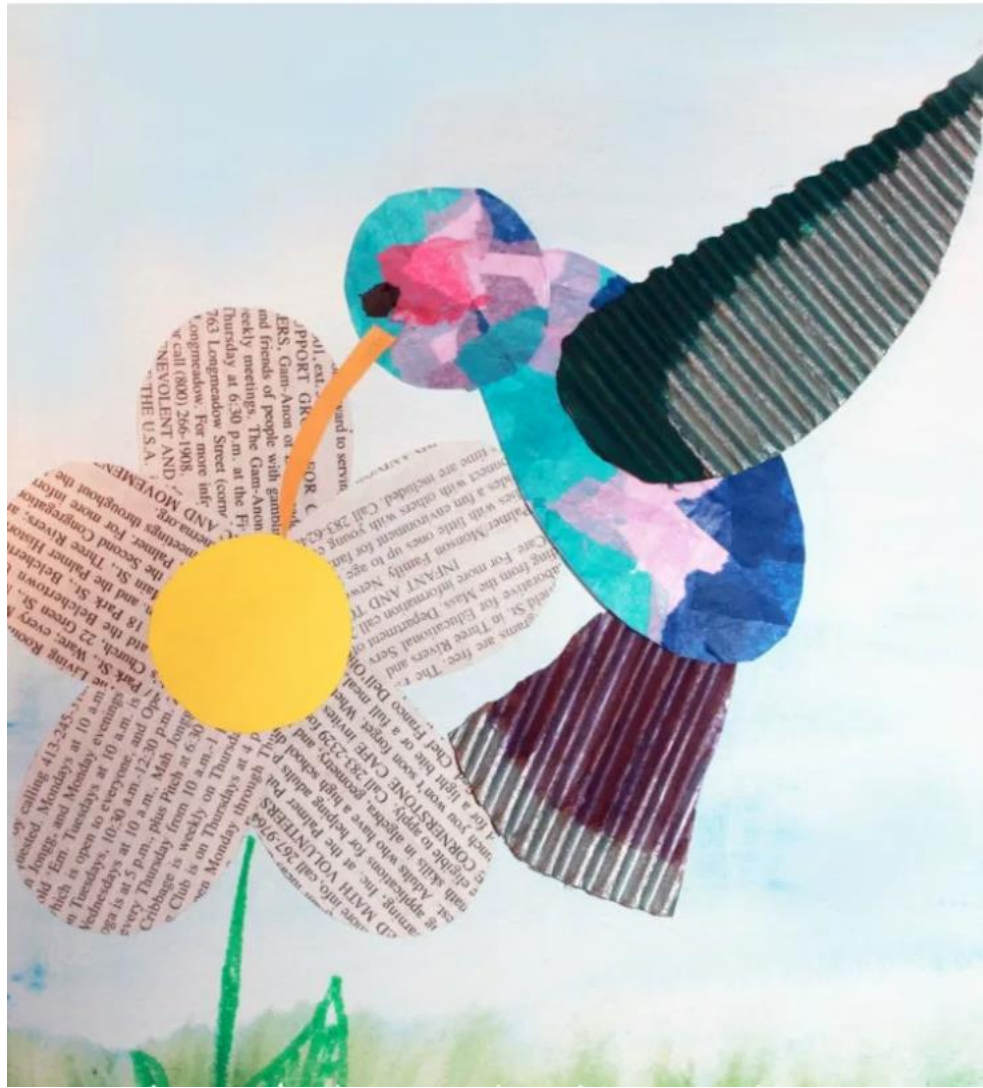


1- Print off template (see next page)

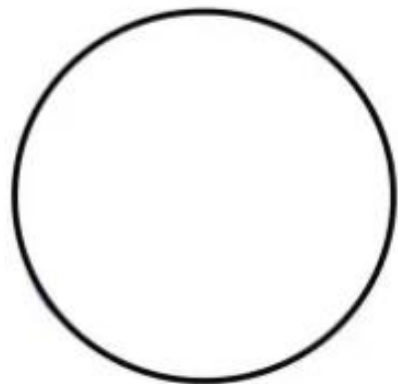
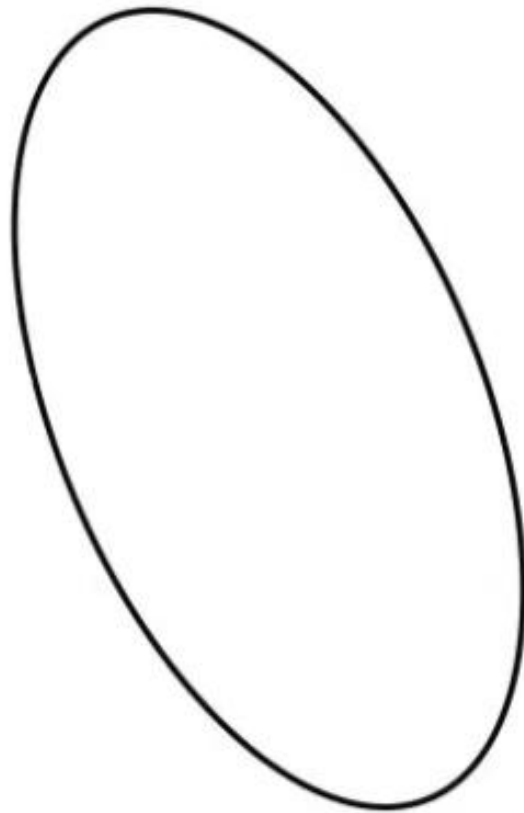
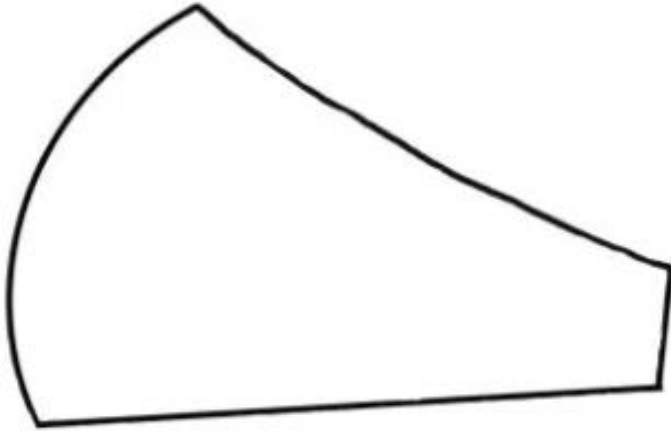
2- Color in pieces

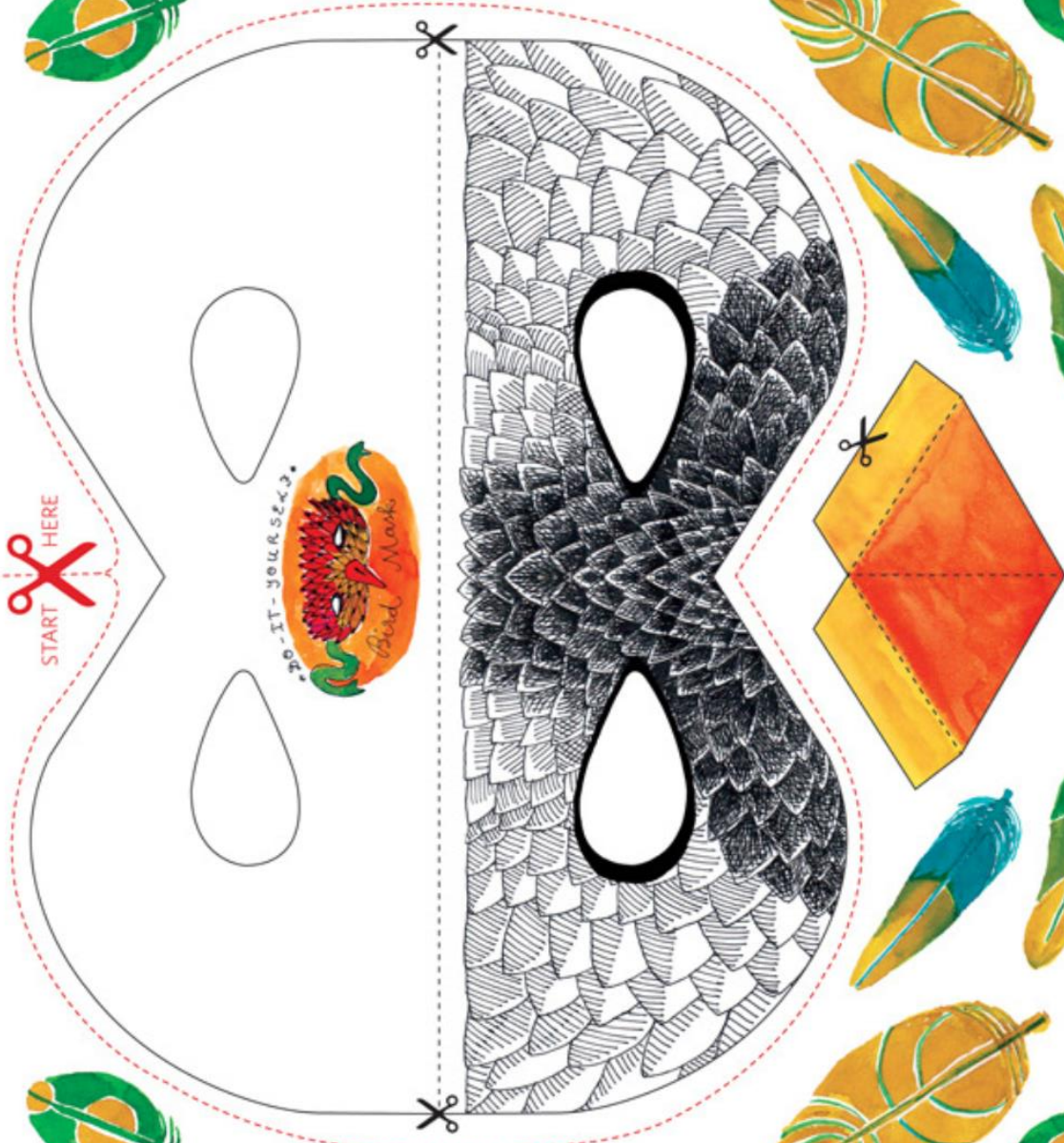
- Use watercolor paints

3- Let dry and then cut out pieces and assemble on a separate background paper.
